


A Season of Celebration

Imost two hundred years ago, on May 22, 1826, members of the Vestry of St. Paul's Church in Syracuse signed the articles of incorporation for the State of New York. St. Paul's has been doing ministry in this place, here at the crossroads of Central New York, for two hundred years.

So we are preparing for a season of celebration at St. Paul's. Our Bicentennial celebration will commence with a festive, public gathering for members and friends from across our community on Saturday, May 16, 2026, and will continue for twelve months, through May of 2027. Senior Warden's Report

t. Paul's operates through volunteers. The Altar Guild, Flower Guild, choir, hospitality, financial management, and the Open Pantry, are just a few examples of groups that rely on volunteers to keep our worship, outreach, and events running effectively. As a Warden I've learned how many people give their time to keep the spirit of St. Paul's thriving.



We may think of this kind of volunteerism as being motivated merely by altruism, but just down the road in Ithaca, Dr. Anthony Burrow, a professor at Cornell University, is conducting research into happiness. He believes he can show that making a contribution can increase one's sense of purpose and general happiness. In an October interview he told Dana Milbank of the *Washington Post* "Invite people to think about a contribution they want to make and help them [to] make that contribution, and that person may walk around with greater purpose than if they hadn't done that."

This may seem obvious to those of us that give our time to St. Paul's. Who hasn't felt good after helping in some way at church by ushering, or hosting coffee hour, or setting up for the Open Doors gala dinner. Milbank notes that evidence suggests increasing one's sense of purpose can have outsize mental and even physical health benefits. Research in recent years has found that a greater sense of purpose is associated with reduced inflammation under stress, lower risk of cardiovascular disease and stroke, slower age-related cognitive decline, and greater longevity, as well as improved perseverance, resilience, and mood, and the ability to face stressful situations with less negative emotion.

Purposeful people aren't necessarily successful, but they are more adaptable during setbacks. There is no better example of adaptability during setbacks than our Open Doors project team having to readjust and reschedule when hazardous materials were found, and hidden damage revealed during construction, and mitigation efforts and added work threw off project timelines.

Too often life is viewed as transactional: I'll do something for you if I there is some benefit to me. The Gospel of Luke has Jesus asking ".. if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you?" The essence of the contributions our members make to St. Paul's is that nothing is expected in return. But we are now learning that there are benefits to contributing in this way.

St. Paul's is not a large congregation. Our vibrant spirit is possible because a large portion of our members are willing to help in so many different ways. This surely is a core reason why St. Paul's has been able to adapt, reorganize, and refocus for 200 years (next May) and continues to be a vital force in Syracuse.



recently attended the Memorial Service for David Garvey. I knew him in a cursory way, passing the peace or nodding hello. And then he wasn't there anymore. Apparently, as his health failed, his ability to attend church faded. It's what happens when we age or get sick.

I remember a slight, older woman named Shirly who attended a former church. She'd been a church member for only a month or so when her son died of AIDS. No one should bury their children. Anyway, Shirly asked if she could have a service for her son at the church and it was approved. Shirley also asked if she could bring in food and coffee...she'd provide the paper plates and do the cleanup herself. I was lucky to be on the




committee that declined her request. We were having nothing to do with that! Her son was a child of God and deserved better.

So, our little committee pulled out the good dishes, the tablecloths, and the coffee machine. Several of us make cookies, coffee cakes, and finger food. Shirly's family brought some hot foods and we served them on the matching platters. Afterwards, we sent the leftovers home with Shirly and washed the dishes in the super-fast dishwasher.

The takeaway is that Shirly never forgot the one place that loved her son as much as she did. It was an honor for me to have been a small player in that activity.

This past Sunday I watched a group of St. Paul's members offer similar comfort to the family of David. I don't know how deeply any of the family members felt the love, but I know the love was present that day.

So the next time you attend a funeral or memorial service or help with the reception, remember that, some day, your family will feel the love and be grateful.

Launiel is also the administrator and teacher at the Ruth Colvin Adult Literacy Center in Paulette.


One of the first steps is to call your priest.

It is important to have talked with our priest about what you would like as a "service". On St. Paul's website under "other" you can look up funeral services.

There is so much more that we discussed. Please plan to attend the January session, the date to be announced. Topics will be: entering the hospital and knowing what to expect; homecare and Hospice.
