# AP Calculus Class

*Strive to enter through the narrow gate...for the gate is narrow and the road is hard that leads to life.*

Matthew 7:13 & 14

**D**id you take AP Calculus class in high school? I didn't. I'm guessing that if I had taken AP Calculus I would have found it to be the most difficult course in high school. Calculus is the mathematical study of continuous change. From my conversations with people who have taken calculus, there are two things necessary for success: an excellent teacher and a serious, systematic method of study.

If the different phases of life could be compared to one's journey through high school, I would say that the past three years have been like taking AP Calculus. The past three years have required a serious approach to life and every bit of intelligence and energy we can muster. The past three years have involved quite a bit of suffering and times of despair.


It appears that, though we are getting close to the end of this particular challenging 'course', we have a few more challenges in front of us. Many of our members have had Covid infections in the past two months. The seasonal flu seems to be infecting people with renewed vigor; several of us who were vaccinated came down with breakthrough cases. Most of us are wearing masks again, at least some of the time, to limit our risk of infection.

We desperately want to get back to normal life, yet we are constantly weighing the risk. Is it worth the risk of taking off my mask to drink a cup of coffee at coffee hour? Is it ok for me to attend a choir concert if the choir is not wearing masks? Is it ok for me to attend Bible Study? Three years after SARS-CoV2 was first identified, we are entering yet another winter of uncertainty.

There is only one way to move through this time with integrity and health. We can only move deeper into the way God is calling us to live. How will you move deeper into the way of love? What will you do to move deeper into the way of gratitude and stewardship of the gifts God has given you?

I don't know what ways will work for you, but I am certain of one thing. When you move deeper into the ways God is leading us, you will, in some way, come face to face with God. As you move deeper into love, deeper into stewardship, deeper into gratitude, you will learn and know more of God than you have ever known before.

This is what Mary and Joseph discovered as they moved deeper into the reality of the incarnation of God's love in our lives. The journey required something extraordinary. They were required to muster every bit of intelligence and energy they had. They came face to face with God.

## December Meeting

The Vestry held its regular December meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 13, 2022. Given the continued illness of some members, a Zoom format was used so they could participate from home. Substantive topics and actions of the meeting were as follows:

The Nominations Committee, made up of the two wardens as co-chairs, plus members Tom Cantwell, Betsy Elkins, DJ Igelsrud, and Doug Mouncey, reported for the record its slate of nominees being put up for election at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 29; namely Marion Greenhalgh for the one warden position, and Barbara Bell, Matthieu van der Meer, and Joe Moorman for the three, full-term, Vestry-membership positions. The report was received by the Vestry as per our Bylaw rules.

Our Treasurer, Doug Mouncey, brought forward a recommendation from the Finance Committee to approve the 2023 St. Paul's Church budget. Keeping in mind the discussion of this budget at the November Vestry meeting, some additional questions were asked and responded to, and action to approve taken.

The topic of building security came up – especially in light of continued gun violence in our country, and threats to certain kinds of houses of worship around the country and the larger world. After considerable discussion it was decided that the conversation will go forward in one format or another; perhaps to start with some articles in the Courier.

The children interpreted it to mean each had to put one ornament on the tree. The Chapel tree has seven ornaments on it. I envisioned a few more ornaments.





# Lenten Retreat: Journaling as a Spiritual Practice

**A** few years ago our leaders interviewed members of St. Paul's. One of the things we learned is retreats can be one of the most meaningful parts of our spiritual journeys.

In 2023, for the first time in three years, we plan to hold an in-person day retreat. This year's retreat is scheduled for February 18<sup>th</sup>, which is the last Saturday before Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent. The idea of a Lenten retreat is to attend the retreat and then, perhaps, choose to make a commitment to engage in the spiritual practice for the duration of the season of Lent.

The topic of our retreat is *Journaling as a Spiritual Practice*. During the retreat we will talk about the where, when, how, what and why of spiritual journaling. I will give participants four different assignments (prompts) over the course of the day. Participants will spend parts of the day working, writing, and reflecting on their own, and part of the day in fellowship and conversation times with the group.

As with everything in the winter of 2023, we cannot be completely certain what will be happening with Covid and other infectious diseases in the middle of February. I ask that all participants take a Covid test at home prior to attending the retreat, and to stay home if they have a positive result or symptoms of illness. If infection numbers seem to be especially bad in early February we will postpone the retreat until the second half of April.

# Thank You Bill & Betsy Elkins!

**B**ill Elkins spent decades working as a residential and commercial architect in Syracuse. In 1995 he started creating watercolors generally working from photographs from his travels abroad. And he always created some sketches in a sketchbook to document his travels.

Bill retired in 2015 and began to devote more time and energy to the urban sketching closer to home. During the past seven years, Bill has spent time almost every day observing and sketching everyday scenes here in Syracuse as well as when travelling.


Bill's energy and leadership are magnetic; in 2017 he formed a chapter of Urban Sketchers International which now has over 300 members in CNY. In 2018 Lester Holt sent a film crew to interview Bill about urban sketching for the NBC Nightly News. In 2018 he and Betsy traveled to Porto Portugal to attend the International Symposium of Urban Sketchers where he studied and sketched with over 800 urban sketchers from around the world.

In 2019 Bill and Betsy moved from their house on the East side, into an apartment a few blocks from St. Paul's. With less space at home, Bill began to rent studio space from St. Paul's on the second floor of the parish house. As we are approaching the time when *Open Doors* project construction will begin in the parish house, Bill decided it was time to close up his studio and sell his sketches and larger works of art.

On Sunday, November 13<sup>th</sup>, Bill and Betsy held a grand 'Lost our Lease' sale in the Hansen Dining Room. More than sixty people came to the sale, and many of us brought home one of Bill's beautiful works of art.

The remarkable twist in this story is that at the end of their art sale Bill and Betsy donated 100% of the proceeds (about \$5000) to *Open Doors*. The cash donation was the result of hundreds of hours of Bill's creative energy and many hours of organizing and physical work from Betsy. This is also just the latest contribution Bill Elkins has made to St. Paul's. In the first weeks of his retirement Bill drew up the existing floor plans of the entire parish house for the group that had just begun to explore possible uses for this space. Bill has designed and donated many sketches of St. Paul's that have been turned into notecards. There was such a strong response to Bill's sketch of the Rainbow Doors on Fayette Street that we designed a new church logo around this beautiful image. When I go to national church conferences and share my business card all of the other clergy ask me, "How did you come up with **that logo?**"

We have received great treasures, in many forms, from Bill Elkins. I trust that I speak for our entire congregation in giving hearty thanks to Betsy and Bill for this latest, most generous gift!




# Contribution Envelopes


