#### St. Paul's is people...caring!

Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. 1 John 3:18

hat is one of the little mottos that rumbles around in my head each week as I walk through our buildings, meeting, talking, and working with our members and staff. Any given day at St. Paul's I might see three or five or ten instances of people working together with faithfulness and love, or individuals doing some extra piece of work, largely unseen by others. I say to myself: "There you go! St. Paul's is people, caring." Every Sunday is a veritable stream of 'St. Paul's people, caring' moments, from ushers to fellowship hosts, musicians to members exchanging the Peace: many, many people doing something extra that reveals they really care.

A few weeks ago on a Sunday morning, a tremendous gathering of caring people was at work in the Hadley Chapel, during one of our *Godly Play* classes. The leaders included two of the usual suspects: Barbara Bell and Jeanne Avery, the

two wise women who guide and lead the Christian formation of our children every Sunday, week after week, month after month. One of the remarkable things about Barbara and Jeanne is the creativity and faithfulness they bring to their task. They are always cooking up exciting, interesting ways to engage the children in conversations about God, God's creation, and Jesus.

Sometime around Easter, Barbara invited one of our most experienced gardeners, Tim Cassavaw, to lead the children in a spring planting project, called 'Seeds to Flowers'. Tim purchased and assembled all of the materials for the project several days before the event. On April 11th, Jeanne and Barbara sent out a special notice to parents and grandparents of the children, encouraging them to wear clothes suitable for the activity.

The big day was April 14th; Hadley Chapel was full of activity and joy. Tim led the activity and five other adults were there to help the children. Five children participated. As you can see by these photos, the children treasured the results of their work.

There is a reason all of the people, children and adults alike, are smiling in these photos. Everyone, the adults especially, are showing their love for one another, not just with words, but in truth and action. Deep inside the children know they are treasured by the adults, because of the actions of the adults. They are learning they can trust these adults. In this, they are also learning they are beloved of God.

You are also beloved of God. For many of us, it is easy to see with the little children; it is easy to see that these children are beloved of God. Notice that the elder of the congregation, the one who wrote the three 'Letters of John' found in the New Testament, referred to the members of the congregation as 'little children'. His main message to them is that they, no matter the difficulties of their lives (and there were significant difficulties for them), were all beloved children of God. You are also a beloved child of God.

#### Senior Warden's Report

Once the Open Doors project is complete, I will update the EAP and place at least one copy in the Brewster Room for anyone's perusal.

#### **CONTINUITY PLANNING**

Should an incident occur at St. Paul's, normal administrative, financial, or logistical services might not be available. If this happens, the Rector will determine what administrative services can be maintained at the church and which services will be provided from an alternate facility, such as a private home. Volunteers will be solicited to accomplish certain tasks that would be necessary to continue worship

services and other ministries.

The primary objective of continuity planning is to ensure church services and activities can continue following a disaster or other debilitating event. Important factors to consider when planning for the continuity of church operations include:

- Facility relocation if St. Paul's facilities become unusable, such as in the case of fire damage or prolonged utility disruption, it is important to have an agreement with a pre-identified neighboring church or other nearby facility to hold services. This helps to ensure normal functions are maintained.
- **Preservation of essential records** this is vital if the church is to resume functioning after a major incident. Vital records should be duplicated and kept in a safe location or on the cloud. These records include insurance documents, christening records and financial records.
- Administrative controls during and after an incident, it is imperative that accurate records are kept to determine what resources are acquired or expended during the incident. If any expenditure is required before, during, or after an incident, the Rector will authorize any purchase in advance. An activities log should be kept by the Business Manager of these activities and expenditures and will be reconciled in the next budget report to the Vestry.
- Inventory of valuables an accurate inventory of items of value along with the replacement cost or
  value of the items should be maintained. Valuables include art, silver, furniture, appliances, and other
  objects considered essential to St. Paul's ministries. A log with photos of these items should be
  maintained in the Business Manager's office as well as in a secure location such as a cloud storage
  system.
- **Safety equipment** the Buildings & Grounds Chairperson will create a schedule of safety equipment inspections to determine if they are serviceable or in need of replacement. The locations of all of these safety resources are included in the Appendices. The Buildings & Grounds Chairperson will forward any requests for funds to the Rector and Treasurer for inclusion in budget requests.

Hopefully this EAP will never need to be used except for drills and training, but it's always good to be prepared. Please contact me if you have any questions, or would like to work on the updating of the plan when the time comes. Stay safe and aware!

#### Junior Warden's Report

he late Senator Everett Dirksen, in talking about the Federal Budget, claimed, "A billion here, a billion there, and pretty soon you're talking about real money." Well, knock off six zeroes and we have an analogous situation at St. Paul's when it comes to maintaining our building and grounds: a thousand here and a thousand there adds up fast. Part of the stewardship responsibility of the vestry and wardens is to make sure there is

always a physical St. Paul's Church, and that it is used wisely both now and in the future.

The Open Doors Project is one aspect of this stewardship. We are renovating, rehabilitating, and rebuilding parts of the church and Parish House to ensure St. Paul's remains a vital and accessible downtown institution. But it is unrealistic to rely solely on our congregation to pay for the St. Paul's upkeep, and so we must consider other ways to produce revenue.

Our vestry has established a small task force, that I am heading, to conduct a feasibility study for renovating the two third floor apartments in the Parish House and converting them to market rate rental units. The idea is to establish a reliable income stream that can be used to pay maintenance costs and to save toward any future renovations. The task force will estimate market rents and expenses to determine how much St. Paul's might net each month.

This is not a new idea. Early concepts for the Open Doors Project included rental apartments, but St. Paul's embraced A Tiny Home For Good as an even greater way to provide a needed service to Syracuse and at the same time put Christ's gospel message of love into action.

The economist John Maynard Keynes wrote, "The importance of money flows from it being a link between the present and the future." This is an especially timely thought as we approach St. Paul's Bicentennial in 2026. Past generations worked so that there would be a church on the corner of Montgomery and East Fayette streets in which we could worship, and now it is our turn to continue that same effort.

#### Wear A Sweater!

It's almost May. It's that time of year when we turn off the furnace at St. Paul's, except for an unusual cold spell. We turn off the furnace in May for three reasons:


- 1. It reduces our heating bill.

#### Open Doors Capital Campaign Challenge Grant

ast month, loyal supporters of St. Paul's for four generations, issued a challenge to St. Paul's Members, Former Members and Clergy:

If St. Paul's receives \$50,000 in pledges or donations to the Open Doors Capital Campaign between March 24th and June 30th, they will match it with another \$50,000!

You are encouraged to read about ATHFG on our website or perhaps follow them on Facebook. There will be opportunities for us to interact with the residents of ATHFG who will be living in our parish house. In the months ahead, our Mission and Service Ministry Team will offer some suggestions about this in addition to how we might help furnish and equip the apartments for our new neighbors.

#### **Open Doors Construction Update**

hile we have been under construction for over 5 months now and you may not be seeing anything different recently as you visit the church, much is going on behind the temporary walls and the Construction Zone signs.

All remediation work (removing hazardous material) is complete for Open Doors. All demolition work is complete. The lobby from Montgomery Street has been totally removed and an impressive elevator shaft is being built now. The old bathrooms adjacent to the Sargent Foyer have been removed and new ones will be constructed soon. Windows are being carefully removed throughout the parish house and restored. Several rooms on the second floor are now part of the Window Restoration Workshop area where this work is being done on site. Be sure you check the latest update video hosted by Cathy Wolff on our website for a discussion with one of the workers doing this window restoration. After the windows are restored, they are returned to their proper location, and they look wonderful.

With warmer weather ahead we expect to see roofing and masonry work done on the exterior of the parish house and eventually the new door from the parking lot to the Sargent Foyer will be added.

While we would love to have our kitchen back online this will be one of the last pieces of construction that will be completed. This room remains an entry way for workers and construction materials from the parking lot and to have them walking through a "new" kitchen (particularly a new floor) would not make much sense. The Project Management Task Force (Betsy Elkins, Rebecca Livengood, Marion Greenhalgh, Tom Cantwell, Greg Tuttle, Doug Mouncey and Philip Major) has begun to articulate the steps for putting our kitchen back together. Before Drulyk installs a new quarry tile floor, a small crew of SPC painters will wash and paint the walls. As all pieces of kitchen furniture are returned to their proper location everything will need to be thoroughly cleaned. Our storage spaces will be different as the old and very large pantry will soon be part of the new expanded bathrooms. We will be looking for some strategic kitchen helpers to assist in this work next fall.

Open Doors is a complicated project. We have experienced some delays due to the unexpected additional abatement work. The work (particularly the window restoration) is tedious and time consuming. Nevertheless, it is coming


#### **Bible Study**

he Pastoral Care team is a small group of St.
Paul's members who deliberately take on the

needs. These individuals make phone calls, write
notes, and visit members in their homes as well as in
institutional settings. Some of the members have been trained
to distribute communion. The leadership at St. Paul's is a team



of two people: a leader and a priest. I, Kira Dirghalli, am the leader. My job is to convene meetings and help coordinate care for our members. I am also in charge of the prayer list. To be added to the prayer list, you may add yourself, add a family member or two. A friend may also be added to the list. I stay in touch with the people on the prayer list, especially those who added a family member or friend.

As our priest, the Rev. Philip Major oversees pastoral care needs for our entire congregation. Part of his job as our rector is to equip and empower the members of St. Paul's in their baptismal ministries as caregivers. Fr. Philip provides pastoral care in times of urgent need, as well as through many daily conversations with our members. Members are welcome to contact Fr. Philip at the office (revmajor@stpaulsyr.org) and set up an in-person visit or a phone conversation.

Our parish prayer list includes (1) the Urgent Prayer list and (2) the Prayers of the People (written by members of St. Paul's, most often for a group of worship services).

Our next meeting will be on Monday, May 13 at 1:00 p.m. in the Brewster Room. New members are always welcome.



#### Sunday May 5th Mountain Goat Race



The annual Mountain Goat race will be held Sunday, May 5th beginning at 9 a.m. The Mountain Goat race is smaller and has less impact on people travelling to St. Paul's for worship. Here are some details:

- The race should not affect those coming to 8 a.m. worship services.
- Clinton Square and South Salina Street from Erie to the Salt City Market will be closed beginning around 8:30.
- The race is held on the south side of the city, so there are no closures of streets north of I-690.
- Those coming from the SouthEast side to St. Paul's will have no road closures until 9:45.
- Those coming from the SouthWest side will have the most significant impacts as many streets will be closed in that quadrant of the city between 9-10 a.m. If you live on the SouthWest side please allow an extra 10 minutes to navigate race detours.
- If you live on the SouthWest side the best alternatives for avoiding race detours might be Geddes Ave and I-81.

They help decrease erosion, reduce flooding damage, improve wildlife and stream habitats, and protect water quality. Should you want to plant trees, ensure they are planted on your own land, and that the location will not interfere with utilities once they've grown.




**Donate your solar eclipse glasses**. You can keep them for your future use, however, if you don't want to keep them there are several collection points across NY to donate or recycle these glasses, such as



libraries and local government offices. Astronomers Without Borders also collects these glasses and sends them to areas expecting the next solar eclipses but may not have a safe way to view the eclipse directly, such as Africa, Asia, and North and South America. These collections points did not list any local Syracuse places, but there was a place in Rochester and Saratoga, or I'm sure you could google how to

get your glasses to them.

Finally, on May 4<sup>th</sup> the 13<sup>th</sup> Annual '**I Love My Park Day**' will take place. This is the largest statewide volunteer event that enhances our public lands, with volunteers cleaning up debris, planting trees and gardens, restoring trails and wildlife habitats, removing invasive species, and working on various site improvement projects. 



AM. This morning session needs 3-5 people.



We may be under construction inside, but we can still look beautiful on the outside and our downtown neighbors enjoy our gardens as they pass by.

















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If St. Paul's receives donations or pledges to Open Doors for \$50,000, they will match these contributions with another \$50,000!
