## **Understanding Episcopal Liturgy**

#3 What is the reason the priest and other worship leaders wear robes during worship?

Our simple white robes are intended to imitate the most basic clothing worn by people during the times when the Old and New Testaments came into being. The white robes worn by worship leaders might look fancy or unusual to us, but simple, unbleached linen or cotton robes were the least expensive, most common garments for people during Jesus' time. They are fastened with cotton ropes because in Jesus' time, zippers, snaps, and Velcro had not been invented, and it was far too much work to make button holes by hand.

The robes we wear at St. Paul's are called 'albs', which means 'white'. The priest and other worship leaders wear robes during worship so that the focus of attention during worship will not be on the clothes they have chosen to wear that particular day. During the hottest weeks of the summer, worship leaders do not wear robes in order to stay cool, but you might notice that when they are not wearing robes, they try to wear clothes in neutral colors that will not be distracting.



#### NICENE CREED

The word "creed" comes from the Latin credo, translated here as "we believe." Credo is not simply belief in accurate propositions, but more deeply a sense of relationship or trust—an alternate translation might be "we give our heart," "we trust," "we rely upon." Developed in the fourth century as a means of unifying a divided church, the Nicene Creed has been used by Christians in

worship for almost two thousand years, and connects us to our ancient ancestors in the Communion of Saints. The Creed is used in worship not because it comprises a list of doctrinal statements one must affirm in order to be considered a Christian, but rather as a song of praise and confidence in the Holy Trinity: God in three persons who creates, redeems and sanctifies a holy people.

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God,

begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father.

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.




