

With God's power working in us, God can do much more than anything we ask or imagine. Ephesians 3:20


n this season we give thanks to God for the many blessings God has given us. In this particular season, in Autumn of 2025, we see the vivid results of God's work among us at St. Paul's. God has worked through the people of St. Paul's to renew and preserve these buildings that are our spiritual home. God has worked through us to make our buildings more

accessible and to expand our ability to serve those in greatest need.

Members of St. Paul's have supported the completion of *Open Doors* in at least four ways:

- 1. St. Paul's members led and organized the effort for ten years! Members led all of the various committees and task forces.
- 2. Members worked together on dozens of tasks during the planning and preparation stage, from serving on task forces to writing grant applications to writing letters to former members of St. Paul's.
- 3. Members took active roles in the execution of *Open Doors*, from painting the kitchen to hauling away fifty year's-worth of accumulated 'leftovers'.
- 4. Members contributed more than \$1.2 million toward *Open Doors*, four times as much as could be expected under traditional fundraising guidelines.

Now that the work has been completed, I stand in awe at was has been accomplished. I am filled with gratitude for all of you, members of St. Paul's, for your support of *Open Doors* and for your patience as the work moved forward, slowly, year by year. Nearly ten years after my arrival at St. Paul's, I continue to marvel at the skills and faithfulness our members brought to the task. Most of all, I am surprised and humbled by the power of God to work through us, weak, fallible creatures, to build a more welcoming, safe, durable place for people to gather and be safe, and care for one another, and be nourished by God's love.

A Time to Celebrate

t was December, in 2015, the first time I walked into St. Paul's Church. I was a candidate to be the Rector of your church. One of the main topics of conversation was the creation of a vision and a plan for the renovation and preservation of St. Paul's Parish House. Led by your Vestry, the people of St. Paul's had created a task force called *Shaping St. Paul's Space*. The task force was led by Rebecca Livengood and included about ten members of the parish.

In 2015 the task force identified four goals for the effort:

- 1. To preserve our beautiful, historic buildings.
- 2. To improve accessibility.
- 3. To expand our ability to serve those in greatest need
- 4. To prepare our buildings for our third century of ministry.


Many of the best, most important things in our life require lots of time and energy, more time and energy than we expect. *Open Doors* required ten years of effort and the skills and commitment of hundreds of people to be completed. During the past ten years, four members of the *Shaping St. Paul's Space* task force have moved away from Syracuse. Many people who gave generously to the project, and one of the original members of the task force, have died since we began our fundraising effort, in 2020.

These realities only point to the main idea of *Open Doors*. We are completing this task, not for ourselves, but for others. We are completing this task out of our love for our neighbors, out of our love for God, and out of the understanding that future generations will need the hope, the joy, and the saving grace of God we encounter at St. Paul's.

So it's time for us to celebrate and to give thanks for all that has been accomplished. I encourage you to join us for our *Open Doors Gala* on Saturday evening, November 8th. During the first part of the Gala we will

have plenty of time to enjoy the warm fellowship of our congregation.
After dinner we will take time to thank the people who led and contributed to the effort, including





our entire congregation.

We are holding the *Open Doors Gala* in our Hansen Dining Room because we are celebrating the preservation and revitalization of the Parish House. Most of the dinner is being catered, so we can give our attention to being together and giving thanks for what has been accomplished. The preparations and logistics of the dinner are being led by Jeanne Chu, Tina Emanuelli, and Joseph von Souder. Please purchase your tickets no later than November 4th. Senior Warden's Report

he Trick-or-Treaters are gone which means it's November, and because it's November I'm thinking about Thanksgiving - not the turkey dinner kind - but real expressions of gratitude. We literally cannot thank people enough for the work they do at St. Paul's and for St. Paul's. Here are just two small recent examples:



- The Sunday before the Open Doors ribbon cutting, people stayed after the 10:00 am service to clean and spruce up the church, the gardens, and the parking lot to make our building and grounds look their best for this long-awaited public event.
- Volunteers arranged and cleaned up after our first potluck dinner in six years.

But there is ongoing work worthy of our thanks too, and St. Paul's Church would not be the vibrant institution it is without the devoted efforts of many of its members. The Open Doors project is very nearly complete...after ten years! And it has been powered by volunteer efforts from the very first visioning of the project until today, and it couldn't have been accomplished without the monetary pledges of this extremely generous congregation.



In the past year the Vestry has had long discussions and made difficult decisions about unanticipated Open Doors expenses, renovating the third floor apartments, fixing the parking lot, and formalizing our relationship with *A Tiny Home For Good* with a lease agreement approved by the Diocese and the State Attorney General's office.

The Finance Committee provides careful stewardship of the church's endowment which is the source of more than half the money needed to keep St. Paul's operating. This work becomes even more important in uncertain economic times. And because it is budget season I am again learning how much work Doug Mouncy does for the church's financial management.

While all this is happening there is still worship every Sunday - even when the Rector is on vacation - as well as Christmas and Easter services, baptisms, weddings, and funerals. These services are enhanced by our organist, the choir, and the Altar and Flower Guilds and the ushers. On many of these occasions there are children in the Hadley Chapel participating in Godly Play. And if that wasn't enough to keep us busy, there are members well into planning celebrations for the church's Bicentennial in May, 2026. It all happens because we love St. Paul's.

We love our neighbors too. Our congregation continues to put Christ's Gospel message into action in the community. Notably, the Open Pantry, which, after government cuts will become a more important resource for our neighbors, is stocked by volunteers who have also successfully applied for grant money to sustain these efforts. There are also outreach efforts to our senior neighbors at the YMCA apartments. But to me, the most moving example of our efforts to help the "least of my brethren," as the Gospel of Matthew puts it, is our willingness to partner with *A Tiny Home For Good* and agree to let them convert the second floor of the Parish House into ten units to house senior men at risk of homelessness.

We often repeat the words "thanks be to God" while worshiping at St. Paul's. As we approach the end of the liturgical year this month and enter the Advent season of hopeful and joyful expectation, let us all give thanks for the spirit, the faithfulness, and the devotion of everyone at St. Paul's

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Are You Interested in the Future of St. Paul's?

he Nominations Committee is prayerfully considering St. Paul's members who would be willing to serve three-year terms on the Vestry – the Church Council - beginning in January 2026.

The nine members of the Vestry, along with two Wardens and Rector, serve as trustees of the church and oversee all parish property and revenue. Vestry members and Wardens are elected on a rotating basis at our Annual Meeting, which is next scheduled for January 25, 2026.

Barbara Bell, Harry Lambright, and Matthieu van der Meer are rotating off the Vestry in January, so we'll need a slate of at least three Vestry nominees to be voted on at the Annual Meeting.

The term for Senior Warden, Joe Moorman, also expires in January. I will become Senior Warden, and we'll need a member of St. Paul's to serve as our next Junior Warden.

Members of the Vestry should:

- Actively listen to the needs and ideas of members
- · Take an active role in parish activities
- Regularly attend Sunday worship
- · Support St. Paul's financially
- Pray for the parish, members and staff
- Engage in the work of the Vestry with creativity, collegiality and hope
- Support St. Paul's as it moves into our 3rd century of being church

Wardens should fulfill all of the above, and in addition have time and energy to meet regularly and

work closely with the Rector, and use their unique gifts of leadership with the understanding that no individual has all of the qualities necessary for leadership.



If you or someone you know could be a great candidate to serve on St. Paul's Vestry or as Warden, please let a member of the Nominations Committee know by December 1st. In addition to myself, Nominations Committee members include Tom Cantwell (member), Willson Cummer (Vestry member), Marion Greenhalgh (member), DJ Igelsrud (Vestry member).

Reminders of the deadline for nominations will be noted during announcements following worship services during the month of November. Thank you, in advance, for your prayerful and

thoughtful consideration of members who would serve the future ministry of our church.

Two Reasons to Make a Pledge to St. Paul's

encourage you to make a pledge of financial support to St. Paul's. I encourage you to make a pledge because pledging your support is a spiritual practice. Every time money leaves my bank account and goes into St. Paul's account, I have a little conversation with myself. It goes like this:

Philip, why are you doing this?

I am doing this because I love St. Paul's and I want to support the work we are doing. But Philip, there are other things you could be doing with your money!

That's the point. It's not really <u>my</u> money! Everything I have been given is a gift from God, including the money in my bank account.

Making a pledge to St. Paul's might seem like a practical decision, but it's mostly a spiritual decision. It's a spiritual decision about whether I <u>own</u>, or am actually a steward, of the resources God has given me.


I also encourage you to make a pledge because in the coming year St. Paul's will not be able to function as it has in the past without the financial support of our members. St. Paul's Finance Committee and Vestry are preparing a budget for 2026. Our budget for 2026 will probably be about \$575,000. Thanks to the generosity of previous generations of members and the stewardship of our Finance Committee, St. Paul's has investment accounts that provide about 2/3 of the income needed for our operations.

We cannot take more than our usual amounts from our investment accounts without jeopardizing the future of St. Paul's. Most of the rest of the funds (about \$150,000) will have to come from our members.

A few of our members are able to make a relatively large pledge of financial support. Most of our members are able to make more modest pledges of support to St. Paul's. All of the pledges made by our members, the large ones and the small ones, all work together to make it possible for St. Paul's to continue to be a haven of hope and joy in our community.

The size of your pledge is not the most important thing. The important things is that our pledges, and then our contributions to fulfill our pledges, will be something that help us remember God has given us everything we have. This is why we are here: to give thanks to God for the many gifts we have been given.

Pledging is a new idea for many of our members. To learn more about St. Paul's finances and the logistics of making a pledge, look for a piece of mail that will arrive from St. Paul's sometime before Thanksgiving.

Holy One,


who meets us not only in action but in stillness:

others.

t St. Paul's, members and staff are often organizing events and engaged in activities of all sorts: fellowship, formation, service, arts and community activities. At St. Paul's, people

are creative about finding new, meaningful ways to make connections and serve

We see a snapshot of the engagement of our members each Sunday morning, as members contribute to the announcements portion of our worship service. Some people really enjoy making announcements, and others make announcements even though speaking to a large

ne ners arge ersity of the people who make and lead

group of people is <u>not</u> their favorite activity. The diversity of the people who make and lead announcements each week is one of the strengths of St. Paul's.

In 2024 we conducted a parish survey. We asked our members for their perspectives on the length of our announcements. Most responses indicated that the time we were spending for announcements in 2024 was 'just right'. Based on a quick survey of our worship recordings from 2024, devoting about 4 minutes for announcements seems to be 'just right' for our congregation.

I want to encourage us to make this good, productive time even better by paying attention to four ideas.

- 1. People need to connect names and faces and activities. It's helpful if announcements are made by people who are leading the activities.
- 2. It's helpful for <u>different</u> people to offer announcements, that way we get to connect their names and faces. (See #1).
- 3. People can remember just a few ideas at a time. It's helpful if announcements focus on the main message and are less than a minute in length.
- 4. We need to prioritize announcements based on connections to St. Paul's. (See #3) It is sometimes helpful for our congregation to hear announcements about community events not directly related to St. Paul's, but sometimes it will work better to publicize community events other ways, such as through a poster or by including it in the eblast.

Beginning on November 30th, the first Sunday of our new church year, I am asking each person making an announcement to fill out an announcement card. You can find these 4"x5" pink cards in the back of the nave. On the front side are a few questions for you to answer. On the back side is a suggested outline for your announcement, like the MadLibs game some of us used to play as kids. (For instance, I suggest you begin by telling the congregation your name.)

Godly Play & Children's Ministry

ur program is forever changing. Our babies are now heading to three years old and have promoted themselves to the big round table where the big kids are homebased. The little ones go to the Godly Play Presentation area, sit and listen carefully to the story. They are not talking as of yet so we have no idea what they are inwardly digesting but soon they will tell us. We obviously can welcome more preschoolers into the Chapel.

The attendance on the other side of the room has grown to nine children. Ages 2- 13 years old. Maisie Johnson has joined us whenever she can. She pretends to be one of the them, she is adored. She is an awesome role model.

We challenged ourselves to write the prayers for the Children's Sabbath Service. I have not recovered and actually I hope I never do! The children expressed such worries- the same concerns as adults. From safety, money, environment, jobs to school, to caring for others, I have been with these children since the onset of Godly Play at St. Paul's. The oldest is 8. I was blown away.

Through all this, I have come to the painful realization that the children have not been taught what is happening when they enter church. The children are told "let's go, hurry we are going to be late" I have never said that people are in deep prayer to God and we need to be as well. They come in expecting bread.

My other wake-up moment has been that we are not tying the Godly Play stories to their lives. What we are now adding is "how does this story relate to your life, what does this mean to you."

Request a Special Flower Arrangement Memorial

id you know that you can request to have a special/memorial flower arrangement made by your talented St. Paul's Flower Guild for any Sunday? There are a few exceptions: flower arrangements are not placed on the altar during Advent and Lent. The sign-up sheets for each month to reserve a specific 2025-2026 Sunday for a flower memorial will be available the first couple of weeks in November, and at other times throughout the year. They will be located near the hospitality sign-up sheets in the Hansen Hall. You'll notice that some of the Sundays are already taken – they can be shared unless you want a specific arrangement. If you have signed up in the past but would like to change the date, or be removed from the list, please make note of that also. The cost of flowers has risen along with everything else, so to help defray some of the cost, we are asking for a minimal donation of \$50, but would gladly accept more. The new entry and security system brings several major advantages for St. I

The new entry and security system brings several major advantages for St. Paul's and our members.



- 1. The new entry system provides us with stronger security for the outside of the building.
- 2. The Sunday School area will have an additional layer of security during worship.
- 3. The fobs are much less expensive than keys.
- 4. The fobs will allow for easier access to the building for people who use the building during the week (such as choir members).
- 5. If you lose your fob, we are able to delete your fob from the system.
- 6. The fobs give us greater control over access to the building by outside groups.

Please look for announcements about replacing your church key with a fob. You can also speak with any member of our staff or any of our team leaders to learn more about our new security system.




Holiday Crafting for the YMCA Seniors

Who is My Neighbor

very month the Haiti Education Mission Inc will be introducing you to one of our neighbors in Haiti. The Haiti Education Mission has been in partnership with people in the northeast department of Haiti since 2009. This monthly portrait of a neighbor in Haiti is an attempt to connect the wonderful people of St. Paul's with the wonderful people in Paulette, Haiti. We can connect by praying for each person introduced. Our first introduction is to Serge Louis Jean.

Serge Louis Jean is 45 years old and he grew up in the village of Paulette. He went to the teacher training college in Cape Haitian. He was an outstanding teacher and was soon appointed principal of St. Joseph School in Dubré, Haiti. Serge is one of the founders of the grassroots organization called FEED. FEED is a French acronym which stands for Foundation for the Development of Children at Risk. The Haiti Education Mission Inc is in partnership with FEED. We support FEED in the areas of education, health care, and nutrition. Serge volunteers with the rest of the board of directors of FEED to improve the lives of the people in the extremely poor rural village of Paulette. Serge also works for the Haitian government in the Department of the Environment. He is active in reforestation and he is involved in responding to natural emergencies such as floods, hurricanes, mudslides etc. Serge is married to Gerda and has two daughters. Please pray for our neighbor, Serge, this month as he continues his work in the community of Paulette, Haiti.




Feminist Theology






